Health Cards

Everybody who is coming to camp will be sent a Health Card after registration. Parents/legal guardians must fill these out with contact information and any allergies / illnesses that are important for the camp's health workers or food-orderers to know about.

Insurance

Everybody who has paid their members subscription to the Norwegian Scouting Union (NSF) is insured from when they leave their front door to participate in a scouting event until they go back in the same door after the event is over. All Norwegian participants at the camp must be members of NSF. Other participants must have valid travel insurance.

Photography

There will be some photography of participants at the camp, and pictures may be used both in the camp newspaper, on our web-pages and in materials that we publish later. If anyone wishes NOT to have their picture taken or used in this way, they must tick the appropriate box on the registration form.

Information about ticks and possible vaccination.

TBE ("tick borne encephalitis") is a viral infectious disease involving the central nervous system. The disease

most often manifests as meningitis, encephalitis, or meningoencephalitis, and is transmitted via ticks (ordinary forest ticks). The virus is found in the ticks' spit glands and is transferred directly when the tick bites to suck blood. No treatment exists, but the disease can be prevented by a vaccine. The TBE virus is common in some regions of Sweden – including the area around Strömstad where the camp is situated. The TBE vaccine gives very good protection and has a very slight risk of serious side-effects, although some can experience fever or influenza-like symptoms. A vaccination course consists of: 3 injections, where the first are given with a 1 – 3 month interval, and the last after 9 – 12 months. This gives effective protection for 3 years.

It is the scouts' parents or legal guardians who must decide whether their child should be vaccinated, and they must also cover the costs. Consult your family doctor.

Price

A reminder of what it costs to come to the camp: For the main camp, NOK 1,900 per participant. Price reduction for siblings (up to 18 years of age): participant number 2,3, etc. from the same family pay NOK 1,400.

For the Family Scouting Camp: Adults NOK 1,300, children over 3 years of age NOK 500, children under 3 years free.

Cancellations between 1st April and 15th June will be charged half the price they would have paid – i.e. NOK 950/ 650 / 250. Cancellations after 15th June will be charged full price unless a doctor's certificate can be shown.

The Family Scouting Camp

The Family Scouting Camp is for everybody who wants to stay at the Camp as a family, either because someone or perhaps the whole family have been scouts previously, or because you are just curious as to what Scouting is. A "family" for our purposes is a flexible concept: it could be a nuclear family, a parent with his/her own and/or other children, grandparents with grandchild-

ren or the neighbours' children etc etc. In the Family Scouting Camp, each "family group" will function as a small scout patrol. That means that both adults and children will be involved in all the patrol's activities – such as fetching food and water, cooking, washing up and so on. Each family will live in their own tent, while mealtimes and cooking will be shared with the other participants in the Family Scout Camp, just as in any other Scout group at the Camp. Every day throughout the week we will take part in various scouting activities that will essentially follow the same programme as the main camp. We will also have some activities just for ourselves in the Family Scouting Camp, based on basic scouting activities involving knives and ropes. Among the possible activities will be: Water activities with the possibility of canoeing, life on the sea-shore/in the sea, an obstacle course, geocaching ("treasure hunt" using GPS), hiking (a one-day hike in the forest with simple cooking on an open fire) and more. The Family Scout Camp will also include an outing to an amusement park / adventure land on the day the rest of the Camp goes on their overnight hike.
